Progress on projects


Assessor Competency Specification Review – Being prepared for publishing
This project is an in-depth review of the current GFMAM document, GFMAM ISO55001
Auditor/Assessor Specification. Technical review group comprising of a cross-section of members to review structure of competency specification was formed and this work has now been completed. This has been a great achievement.

Asset Management System Scheme Specification – Being prepared for publishing

This ISO 55001 Asset Management Scheme document has been sent to Accreditation Bodies globally for consultation and feedback on their interest in the guideline document and possible application. Several responses were received and checked against the Asset Management System Scheme Specification. This project is now complete and will be published on the GFMAM website before Christmas.

Asset Management Maturity Projects – Being prepared for publishing

More and more organisations are achieving conformance with ISO 55001; and some are starting to explore how they can deliver greater value to stakeholders through increasing their maturity in Asset Management. The GFMAM has published three documents on Asset Management maturity that reflect global consensus on what is meant by Asset Management maturity, how to assess organisations' Asset Management maturity and what capabilities are required in assessors approaching this subtle and complex task. These three projects and the relationship between them are shown below:



Criteria for Evaluating Asset Management Indicators - Being prepared for publishing

This project has been completed. It explains the objective criteria and methodology to assess the extent to which a particular measure or indicator is relevant to Asset Management. The methodology considers whether the indicator aligns with the 39 subjects of Asset Management (ref: The Asset Management Landscape – Second Edition, GFMAM) and whether it reflects the 9 benefits of Asset Management highlighted in the ISO 55000 standard (cf. ISO 55000: 2014 Asset management - Overview, principles and terminology, pages 1-2).

The deliverable was a validation model and a first tool which measures the relevance of an indicator to the principles and benefits of Asset Management actions and projects.

Maintenance Management Framework - Ongoing

This project is to revise the Maintenance Framework document to a second edition. After over a year of work by the project team, a draft was circulated to GFMAM member societies for feedback

in July 2020 for a 6-week review period. Over 300 unique comments were received and have been dispositioned. The 2nd edition of the document is expected to be finalised in December 2020 and published in January of 2021.

World Maintenance Day – New Project

This project aligns with the GFMAM objective to bring together, promote and strengthen the maintenance and asset management community worldwide. Although maintenance is a major activity with an enormous impact on the economy, public safety and sustainable development, maintenance people carry out their work outside the public eye and are underappreciated. The general public is unaware of the importance of maintenance and asset management. Too few young people pursue technical careers. As a result, companies and public service organisations in the vast majority of developed and underdeveloped countries are struggling to find talent with the right skills to maintain the industrial and infrastructure asset base. In the current age of the 4th industrial revolution the skills gap threatens to grow.

The goal of this project is to initiate a World Maintenance Day where all stakeholders around the world organise an initiative that celebrates and recognises maintenance as an important activity for overall welfare of the whole of humanity. There was positive feedback from the members of GFMAM with a recommendation to proceed with the first phase of project. The ambition is to celebrate in 2021 the first edition of the World Maintenance Day.
